Blooms Taxomony of Higher Level Thinking (from low to highest level)

Knowledge

- 1. List 3 facts from the story.
- 2. List one character's problem. How did they solve the problem?
- 3. Describe the setting of the story with at least 2 describing words.
 - 4. When did the story take place?
- 5. List 5 words you learned, then write their pronunciation and meaning.
 - 6. What is the time period?
 - 7. Where does the story take place? List all the places mentioned.
 - 8. Which character appears first in the story?
- 9. List the characters and give at least two describing words about each of them.
- 10. What other stories/books has this author written? Have you read any of them?
 - 11. How does the story end?

Comprehension

- 1. List 3 examples of cause and effect.
 - 2. List 5 opinions from the story.
- 3. How did the setting make the story more interesting?
- 4. Think of a main event in the story. Why did it happen?
 - 5. What was the problem? How was it solved?
 - 6. Tell about the story's beginning.
- 7. How did the main character feel at the end of the story?
- 8. If there is a picture in the story: Write what happened BEFORE the picture and write about what happened AFTER the picture.
 - 9. List 5 important events.
 - 10. If you could continue the story, what events would you include? Why?
 - 11. How did the main character feel at the beginning of the story?
 - 12. Draw a picture of a main event in the story.
 - 13. What was the author's purpose? Why did they write this story?
 - 14. Did anyone in the story do something you didn't like? If so, why?
 - 15. Tell in your own words what the story is about. Use at least 3 sentences!
 - 16. Explain why the story has the title that it does.
 - 17. Tell about the story's ending.

Application

- 1. List the important places in the story. Make an imaginary map including those places.
 - 2. List some resources where you could research a topic in the story.
- 3. Give some examples of people who had had the same problems or have done the same kind of thing as the character in the story.
 - 4. Describe one problem situation in the story. How would you have acted in this situation?
 - 5. Did this story give you any new ideas about yourself? Why?
 - 6. Tell about a time the same thing in the story happened to you or someone you know?
- 7. If you had to cook a meal for the characters in the story, what kind of food would you make and why?
 - 8. What would the main character do if they visited our classroom?
 - 9. What lesson did you learn from the story?
 - 10. What would the main character do if he came to your house to visit?
 - 11. Write a letter to a friend recommending this book or story and explain why.
 - 12. What would you do if you could go to the place where the main character lives?
 - 13. Design a cover for this story and explain why you chose this design.

- 1. Which character is least like you and why?
- 2. What part of the story was the funniest and why?
 - 3. Tell 5 ways the main character is like you.
- 4. Tell what things happened in the story that couldn't have happened in real life.
 - 5. Which character is most like you and why?
- 6. If your story was a modern story, compare it with a long time ago and tell what would be different.
 - 7. Compare 2 of the characters using a double bubble and at least 2 sentences.
 - 8. Tell the main idea of the story in 2-3 sentences.
 - 9. What subject does this story/book make you want to learn more about and why?

 10. What part of the story was the most exciting?
 - 11. Why do you think the author gave the story/book this title?
 - 12. Name 2 things in the story that happened "outside' or "inside".
 - 13. Compare this story with the last story you read.
 - 14. What could you do that was just like what the person in the story did?
 - 15. Find the parts of the story that tell who, when, why, where, what, and how.
 - 16. What part of the story was the saddest?
 - 17. Organize the story into parts and think of a good title for each of the parts.
 - 18. Think of a different ending to the story. Tell why you changed it.

Synthesis

- 1. Prepare a book jacket for the story (front and back cover).
- 2. Make an 8 section comic strip with captions showing the main events of the story.
 - 3. Create a poem about the story.
 - 4. Pick a character to give a present to and tell why you gave it to them.
- 5. Design an advertisement for this story/book to use in a magazine-make sure it is neat and easy to read
 - 6. Identify one problem in the story and give your own alternate solution.
 - 7. Pretend you are the main character in the story. Write a diary about what you were doing each day!
- 8. Use your imagination to draw a picture about the story. Then add one new thing that was not in the story.
 - 9. Pretend you are a librarian, would you recommend this book? Why or why not?

 10. Design a poster for the story.
- 11. Rewrite the story by changing someone or something in it-example 3 little dogs instead of 3 little pigs.
 - 12. Make a puppet, poster, or a painting of the main character in the story.
 - 13. What part would you change in the story and why?
 - 14. Write another short story using the same characters!
 - 15. Create a radio announcement to advertise the story.
 - 16. Think of a new title for the story/book and tell why you choose it.

Evaluation

- 1. Was the story worth the time it took to read it? Why or why not?
- 2. Which of the characters in the story would you like to take out to dinner and why?
- 3. Compare 2 characters in the story and tell which one you think is better and why.
 - 4. Did you like the way the story ended? Why or why not?
- 5. If you had the opportunity to go where this story takes place, would you want to go? Why or why not?
 - 6. Compare 2 stories you have read. Which one would you recommend to a friend and why?
 - 7. What do you think was the most interesting part of the story and why?
 - 8. What happens in this story that you wish could happen to you and why?
 - 9. Imagine that you are a literary critic. Tell your honest opinion about the story/book. Be concerned with the plot, characters, author's style, and development of the story.
 - 10. Which character in the story would you choose as a friend and why?
 - 11. Could this story have really happened? Why or why not?
 - 12. Which character in the story would you most want to spend the day with and why?
- 13. Tell about the most exciting part of the story. Give at least 3 reasons why you think it was exciting.
 - 14. Is the title a good one or a poor one? Why do you think so?
